The Transforming Love of God - How it Works -(part 1)

Ephesians 2:8-10 / Philippians 2:13

Ephesians 2:8-10

8 For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God;

Ephesians 2:8-10

9 not as a result of works, so that no one may boast.

Ephesians 2:8-10

10 For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand so that we would walk in them.

Philippians 2:13

13 for it is God who is at work in you, both to will and to work for His good pleasure.

Introduction:

Throughout this month of February we have focused our attention of the concept of God's love for us. The Apostle Paul prayed that we may know the love of God in its fullness.

Introduction:

We saw together that God's love is both a pursuing love and a compelling love.

Last week we began to consider the truth that God's love is a transforming love.

Introduction:

We determined to think about this aspect of God's love from the big picture viewpoint. Through Biblical examples and Scripture we saw that God's love transforms people in 4 primary ways.

First, God transforms who we are when we are born again.

Second, God transforms what we believe about everything.

His Word, as revealed by His Spirit, becomes our authority for understanding everything.

Every thought is to be brought captive to the obedience of Jesus Christ.

(2 Corinthians 10:3-6)

Thirdly, God then transforms how we live.

Lastly, God transforms what we pursue.

This is not a one-time process through this 4 step cycle. God continues to transform us in these ways as we journey through this part of our life with God.

Ephesians 2:10 describes this process with the words "we are His workmanship". The ultimate purpose of this work of transformation is to make us more and more like Jesus in every way and to lead us to the pursuit of God's Kingdom and Righteousness above everything else.

This transformation is a work from the inside out.
The Holy Spirit who comes to dwell within us when we are born again leads this transformation process.

The goal is to bring the soul and body of the believer into alignment with the will of God.

The soul is our mind, our emotions, and our will.

Therefore, the work of transformation is to change us so that we use our bodies as instruments of righteousness.

(Romans 6:12-13)

It is to change how we think and believe as the Holy Spirit renews our minds with God's Word.

(Romans 12:1-2).

It is to bring our emotions under the control of the Holy Spirit.

(Galatians 5:22-23)

It is to bring our will to be surrendered to the will of God.

(2 Cor. 5:15).

This transformation is a result of our relationship with God which we are given when we become His children.

This transformation is a work of God alone but it does require our cooperation, and/or our willingness.

In the Scriptures we have read from Ephesians 2 this morning we see two important words.
The words are grace and faith.
Our experience of transformation by God's love is a result of God's grace combined with our faith.

Philippians 2:13 gives us the perfect definition of grace.

Grace is the desire to do God's will ("to will").

Grace is also the power to do God's will ('to work").

Grace is given in these two stages.
Once we experience the first stage
of grace which is to receive
from the Holy Spirit a desire
to want to do God's will
we must then chose faith.

Biblical faith is a trust which leads one to obedient action. So once we are given the desire we then begin to move in the direction of the desire in trusting obedience.

Our faith is in Jesus and in the truth that God's will is best for us. Our faith is a trust that God will supply the power to carry out the obedience.

We cannot desire God's will nor do God's will on our own. We depend upon God's grace alone. Transformation occurs as God gives grace and it is made complete by our choice of obedient faith.

In our desire to look at this concept more closely we will consider how this process of transformation works in four keys areas of God's will for us.

- God's will concerning our salvation
- God's will concerning our character development
- God's will concerning our overcoming sin
- God's will concerning our serving in His Kingdom

In each of the four areas we will consider the process of how grace and faith lead to our being transformed. We must remember that all of this work of transformation is done through a relationship of love between us and God.

The primary tool used by the Holy Spirit to reveal to us God's will is God's Word. We should therefore expect to see in God's Word these four areas revealed clearly as God's will.

The Holy Spirit takes the Word and uses it to create in us an understanding of God's will and a desire to obey His will. The Holy Spirit can use a multitude of ways to bring God's Word to our attention.

For example the Word can be spoken to us, we can read it, and the Word can simply be put into our mind by the Holy Spirit as a thought.

Today let's consider the transformation which occurs as we receive God's gift of salvation.

Next week as God allows we will begin to consider the other 3 examples of God's transforming work in us.

Transformation process example 1 - God's will - our Salvation

God's Word is clear that it is God's will that each person be born again. Each person needs to experience the forgiveness of sin which is possible only through trusting Jesus.

Therefore, the Holy Spirit brings this truth to our attention.

Let's begin with a few Scriptures which reveal the truth of God's will concerning our salvation.

John 1:12-13

"As many as received Him (Jesus) to them He gave the right to become children of God, even to those who believe in His Name, who were born not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God".

Clearly the gift of becoming a child of God comes as a result of God's will.

When a person trusts Jesus ("received Him") the person is given the power to become God's child.

Here we see grace providing the understanding and desire of God's will. We see the person expressing trust in Jesus, who is the only way revealed by God whereby we can receive the gift of eternal life.

As a person trusts in Jesus, God's grace then instantly provides the power to experience God's will. In this passage the person is called "born of God".

1 Timothy 2:3-4

"This is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth."

2 Peter 3:9

"The Lord is not slow concerning
His promise, as some count slowness
but is patient towards you not wishing
for any to perish but for all
to come to repentance."

God's will is clear. He desires every person to experience salvation.

Acts 4:10-12
tells us that there is no other name
whereby we must be saved
except the Name of Jesus.

Acts 4:10-12

10 let it be known to all of you and to all the people of Israel, that by the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene, whom you crucified, whom God raised from the dead—by this name this man stands here before you in good health.

Acts 4:10-12

11 HE is the STONE WHICH WAS REJECTED by you, THE BUILDERS, but WHICH BECAME THE CHIEF CORNER stone.

Acts 4:10-12

12 And there is salvation in no one else; for there is no other name under heaven that has been given among men by which we must be saved."

We read together Ephesians 2:8-10 earlier which declares, "For it is by grace through faith that we are saved".

The grace of God gives us the understanding of our need of salvation and that Jesus is our only hope of a right relationship with God.

Let's dig a little deeper.

When we simply trust in Jesus believing that He died upon a cross to pay for our sins and that He rose from the dead three days later we are given grace to experience the new birth.

Romans 10:9
declares that we "shall be saved".
The moment we trust in Jesus seeking His forgiveness, thanking Him for His sacrifice, desiring a relationship with Him He saves us by His grace.

This new birth begins a wonderful, eternal journey with God.
This new birth is necessary because we are born dead in our sins.

In Ephesians 2:5 we see that even when we were dead in our sins we were made alive with Christ (quickened-KJV).

Ephesians 2:5

5 even when we were dead in our transgressions, made us alive together with Christ (by grace you have been saved),

This phrase is followed by the words "by grace you have been saved".

God's grace gives us the desire to be saved and the gift of God's transforming power which changes us as we believe.

Romans 12:3b tells us that God gives every person a measure of faith. God's grace even provides the faith we need. We must simply exercise the faith we are given to experience the transforming power of God's love in salvation.

Let's dig a little deeper.
In John 16:8 Jesus told us
that the Holy Spirit would convict
the world of sin, righteousness
and judgement.

John 16:8

8 And He, when He comes, will convict the world concerning sin and righteousness and judgment;

So the Holy Spirit's role is to convict people.
By God's grace the Holy Spirit reveals to a person the truth about sin.
The Holy Spirit uses this truth to convict each person of sin.

The truth is that each person has sinned because Romans 3:23 reveals that all people have sinned.

Every person who is honest about the subject will confirm that God's Word is true in this case.

All have sinned.

Each person therefore deserves spiritual death or separation from God because of their sin.

Romans 6:23a

reveals that the wages of sin is death.

The Holy Spirit also convicts people concerning righteousness.

No one can be righteous in God's eyes by doing good deeds.

The only righteousness God will accept is the righteousness of Jesus. Jesus alone lived a perfect life without sin. His righteousness is credited to our account removing our sin the moment we trust in Jesus alone for our salvation.

Jesus took our sin spiritually upon Himself on the cross so that He could pay for us the penalty of spiritual death -separation from God.

When a person trusts in Jesus the sacrifice of Jesus is applied to the person's life.

2 Corinthians 5:21
reveals very clearly this truth.

2 Corinthians 5:21

21 He made Him who knew no sin to be sin on our behalf, so that we might become the righteousness of God in Him.

The Holy Spirit also convicts of judgment. He makes it clear that to reject God's gift of eternal life through Jesus means a person remains spiritually dead and once they experience death in this life they face the judgment.

Hebrews 9:27 tells us "it is appointed for men to die once and after this comes the judgment". The Holy Spirit makes it clear that there are only two options.

We can trust Jesus and have eternal Life or reject Jesus and spend eternity separated from God in a lake of fire which was created for the devil and all of the fallen angels. 1 John 5:11-13 speaks this truth about this choice concerning Jesus.

1 John 5:11-13

11 And the testimony is this, that God has given us eternal life, and this life is in His Son.

1 John 5:11-13

12 He who has the Son has the life; he who does not have the Son of God does not have the life.

1 John 5:11-13

13 These things I have written to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, so that you may know that you have eternal life.

So we see in the experience of salvation how the transforming love of God works in us.

We are saved by God's grace giving us the desire and the power to be saved.

Our willingness to exercise the faith God provides by His grace allows God to place our lives into Christ causing us to be new creations, born again from above.

Application

Have you experienced the new birth?

Do you know with 100% certainty that you have been given the gift of eternal life?

Application

How is God's love seeking to transform you right now?

Whatever God is seeking to do in you will be accomplished only by His grace and your faith in Him.

Application

Is He:

Urging you to trust Jesus for salvation?

Urging you to allow Him to renew your mind so that what you believe will align with His Word?

Application

Is He:

Urging you to change an aspect of how you live?

Urging you to pursue first His Kingdom and Righteousness?

Application

The desire to do God's will is an act of God's grace towards you. Trust Jesus in this area of life and experience the power to do God's will. The result will be that you are being changed to be more like Jesus.

Application

You are being changed to prepare you to serve in God's kingdom both now and in the life to come.
Once you have trusted in Jesus for salvation you are God's workmanship (His project) created in Christ Jesus for good works.

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
